REPORT

JUNE PASSENGER TRAFFIC EXPERIENCES DOUBLE-DIGIT GROWTH

With increased seat capacity and the return of two dual-class CRJ-700 regional jets in the June schedule, overall passenger traffic increased 11.9% compared to last June's mid-pandemic levels. But with an impressive 34.5% increase in monthly seat capacity compared to last June, passenger demand was unable to keep up, resulting in a somewhat reduced monthly passenger load factor of 73.5%. But considering ongoing monthly variations in LYH seat capacity that continue due to the pilot shortage and other staffing challenges, local air travel has remained steady despite an industry trend toward higher air fares.

AMERICAN AIRLINES' FALL SCHEDULE REMAINS RANGE BOUND AMID STAFFING SHORTAGES

As the airline industry continues to grapple with staffing shortages, the majors' regional partners are suffering disproportionately as the mainline carriers accelerate their recruiting of regional pilots. The result has been increased challenges for the regionals to maintain their system flight schedules, including in markets like LYH. But despite an August flight schedule that offered some 13% fewer seats than June, LYH's September schedule is showing a return of six-plus daily departures to Charlotte most days, with the added benefit of a late-morning 76-seat, dual-class CRJ-900 regional jet roundtrip. I'll have more details on our American service and the impact of airline staffing shortages at Monday's Commission meeting.

LYH RECEIVES ADDITIONAL FUNDS FROM "INFRASTRUCTURE AND BIL" GRANTS

The most recent federal program approved by Congress provided additional funding for a range of infrastructure-related capital projects at our nation's airports. The \$1 trillion "Bipartisan Infrastructure Law" targets \$15 billion for airport projects that are eligible under the existing Airport Improvement Program (AIP) and Passenger Facility Charge (PFC) program. As part of that, LYH has been awarded a total of \$6,448,900 over five years to be invested in runways, taxiways, safety and sustainability projects, as well as terminal, airport-transit connections and roadway projects. For the first year, LYH has received FAA approval of Infrastructure Entitlement funds of \$1,289,780 which has been earmarked to offset the State and local costs of our new North G.A. Development area (MRO) facility.

UPCOMING AGREEMENTS TO BE PRESENTED TO CITY COUNCIL FOR APPROVAL

Hertz - As you will recall, the Hertz Corporation has requested to resume its rental car services at Lynchburg Regional Airport beginning September 1, 2022. City Council was briefed on this item at its work session on Tuesday, July 26, and is expected to vote at the public hearing scheduled for August 23, 2022.

Freedom Aviation - In addition, following execution of a new franchise agreement with Freedom Aviation, officials have approached the Airport to request renewing their existing Fuel Farm Agreement. Considering Freedom's current agreement is scheduled to expire June 30, 2023 they would like to terminate the agreement in order to make a new agreement consistent with the term of the recently approved FBO agreement. A briefing to Council is scheduled for August 23rd, with a Council vote scheduled for September 6, 2022. The effective date of the new agreement will be October 1, 2022 and consist of a 5-year term with a 5-year renewal option at the end of the original term.

TSA - Federal Government representatives have approached the Airport and requested a supplemental lease amendment to their existing TSA lease agreement scheduled to terminate January, 31, 2023. This Amendment will continue their existing leasehold footprint and will equalize the amortized payments annually throughout the new term. A briefing to City Council is set for August 23rd with a Council vote scheduled for September 6, 2022. The effective date of the new agreement will be October 1, 2022 for a 5-year term with a 5-year renewal option at the end of the original term.

Arinc Inc. - Arinc is an aeronautical radio company that currently has a transmitting antenna located on the passenger terminal building to support American Airlines' communications with pilots via air-to- ground radio equipment. The leasehold footprint for the antenna is 16 square feet with a rental rate for the space set at \$1,200 per year. A briefing to City Council is planned for August 23rd, with a Council vote scheduled for September 6, 2022. The effective date of the new agreement will be October 1, 2022 and includes a 5-year term with a 5-year renewal option at the end of the original term.

SPORTS CHARTERS SET TO RESUME AGAIN IN FALL

Freedom Aviation has notified airport officials that it will once again be coordinating flights and providing ground handling for a number of airline charter operations in support of various Liberty University sports programs. For the larger airline charters, Allegiant Air will once again be operating the charters, utilizing the larger Airbus A320 aircraft and seating from 177-183 passengers to accommodate the Liberty University football team.

PASSENGER TERMINAL RESTROOM RENOVATION PROJECT UPDATE

Phase 1 (design) of the passenger terminal project has now been completed by our consulting engineer, RS&H. The final design included all engineering work, project renderings and bidding documents. As you will recall, construction is expected to take approximately seven months. Upgraded features will include new touchless high-efficiency fixtures, sinks, hand dryers and the overall motif will incorporate local design features. To ensure adequate passenger services are maintained throughout construction, air conditioned and heated portable restroom facilities will be available to the public. We are anticipating construction costs totaling near \$2 million, with primary funding expected at 80% through State entitlement grant funds.

PASSENGER BOARDING BRIDGE RELIABILITY AND MAINTENANCE ISSUES

The passenger boarding bridge (PBB) has experienced multiple issues over the past six months. Immediately after the PBB was placed in service, the manufacture filed bankruptcy. All maintenance and warranty work required to keep with PBB operational was difficult as all parts are proprietary to the manufacturer. Of recent, we have contracted an alternate maintenance company experienced with maintaining PBB to assist us with repairs. Currently, the PBB requires significant parts replacement which have been ordered. In addition, repairs are in progress on the parts removed. We are anticipating the PBB being returned to service in early October.

AGENDA FOR THE COMMISSION MEETING

Monday's regular agenda will include reports on the Hertz Corporation, Fuel Farm, TSA and Arinc Inc. agreements, followed by formal action from the Commission on recommendations. The Hertz recommendation will be taken before City Council at its August 23rd meeting, with the remaining recommendations to be voted on at the September Council meeting. In addition, I will provide an update on current regional airline service challenges and the airport's FY 2022 year-end budget. 1) CALL TO ORDER:

2) APPROVAL OF April 18, 2022 CONSENT AGENDA

3) REPORT OF THE AIRPORT DIRECTOR

A. Existing FBO Leases Overview

- (1) Virginia Aviation Lease (5 years w/5-year option) ends June 30, 2023
 - a. Portion of GA Terminal, Training Center, Hangars 2, 4 and 5
- (2) Falwell Aviation Franchise Ordinance (20 years and six months) ends December 31, 2027 (Franchise Ordinance for more than 5 years)
 - a. Maintenance shop, Hangars 7, 8 and office complex (all significantly below market rate) and 9 (land lease ground rent)

B. New Freedom Franchise

- (1) Freedom Aviation expressed interest in building new 19,600 SF hangar
- (2) Wanted to integrate both existing lease/franchise agreements into one new combined "Franchise" agreement
- (3) Parties negotiated an agreement "in principle"... resulted in:
- (4) A combined franchise plus 5+5 yr. lease in one Franchise Ordinance
 - a. Allows the City and Freedom options at the end of each term
 - b. Hangar 9 will continue as ground lease through Dec. 31, 2027; facility rent reverts to market rate for the remainder of the term

(e) LYH goal: Increase quantity/quality of AA service to pre-pandemic levels; explore new market opportunities as industry conditions improve

4) REPORTS OF AIRPORT BUSINESSES

All in favor to approve the franchise agreement. All in favor of recommending Debra Allen as Vice Chair. Mr. Ware asked if there were any questions or comments from the citizens present. There were none.

5) HEARINGS OF CITIZENS UPON COMMISSION MATTERS

Charles Knowlin inquired of the airport authority status. The airport director explained that we are not pursuing aiport authority at this time due to how we are operating.
